## Letter from the Chair

The Nations' Cup is the pinnacle event for our Canadian team. At the CSIO4\* Coapexpan, Mexico, held May 7 through 11, we fielded a team at this qualifying event for the Furusiyya Nations' Cup Final to be held in Barcelona in October. Canada had won the first qualifying event in the North American League in Wellington, Florida, and we rode our wave of success into Mexico with another fabulous win by Team Canada. This is the first time in quite a while that our Nations' Cup team has not included Eric Lamaze and Tiffany Foster, who are both competing at the top shows in Europe this spring.

Our team in Mexico was led by our most experienced member, Ian Millar. "Captain Canada" gave a riding display that belies his years but demonstrates his vast experience and incredible skill and expertise. Riding Star Power, he produced nothing short of two brilliant clear rounds, followed by a nail-biting jump-off against America's strongest rider, two-time Olympic team gold medalist Beezie Madden. After Beezie had a rail down, Ian calmly and steadily jumped clear to seal the victory for Canada. Ian was the first to give credit to his team members. What a great job they all did!

Kara Chad wore the red jacket for the first time on a senior team and gave notice of her future potential with a double-clear effort aboard Alberto II. I am hard pressed to remember a "rookie" jumping to such a result in a Nations' Cup! Jonathon Millar proudly carried the family name with a five-fault effort followed by a clear round on Calvin Klein. As the trail blazer, Chris Sorensen posted scores of five and then four faults with Bobby. It is so encouraging to field a team that can pull off the win as we approach the World Equestrian Games later this year.

Our team was led by Chef d'Equipe Terrance "Torchy" Millar, Equine Canada Team Manager Karen Hendry-Ouellette, and stable manager Darren Roberts. Our High Performance Chair Mark Laskin was thrilled to have been able to send a team with such strong support staff. Canada now leads the standings in our Nations' Cup League with only one more event to come at Spruce Meadows in June. Thank you, Team Canada – you make us proud! Thank you also to Own The Podium, whose financial support makes much of our international travel possible.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank some departing members of The Warm-Up Ring's editorial board, Lindy Welsby and Chris Pack. They have completed their terms and we do appreciate their time and skills in helping to edit and review the newsletter each month. We welcome new member Diana Langmuir to the editorial board; I know her literary skills will be a great asset. # Canada Leads Furusiyya FEI Nations' Cup North American League

Following its second consecutive win, Canada continues to dominate the North American, Central American and Caribbean League of the Furusiyya FEI Nations' Cup. Team Canada won the second of three qualifying events on May 9 at the CSIO4\* Coapexpan in Mexico.

Team members Kara Chad of Calgary, AB, Ian Millar of Perth, ON, Jonathon Millar of Perth, ON, and Chris Sorensen of Caledon East, ON, came out on top in the CSIO4\* \$80,000 Furusiyya FEI Nations Cup after edging out Team USA in an impressive jump-off between legendary riders, Ian Millar and Beezie Madden of the USA.

produced only four clear rounds, two of them by Canadians. Sorensen was the trailblazer for Team Canada, tackling the challenging track set by course designer Frederic Cottier of France. Paired with Bobby, a 12-year-old Dutch Warmblood gelding co-owned with Britland Hughes, Sorensen had just one rail and one time fault for a total of five faults. Jonathon Millar received an identical score aboard Millar Brooke Farm's 10-year-old Swedish Warmblood gelding, Calvin Klein.

Chad, who is just 18 years old and making her Canadian Show Jumping Team debut, put in an impressive performance, achieving a clear round for Canada aboard Stone Ridge Farms' 11-year-old Holsteiner gelding, Alberto II.

Ian Millar posted another clear round for Canada while riding in the anchor position aboard his 2012 London Olympic partner, Star Power, a 13-year-old Dutch Warmblood gelding owned by Team Works.

Coming into the second round carrying a total of five faults, Canada continued to heat up the competition. Sorensen bettered his time from the first round, but had a rail down at an oxer early on course for four faults. Jonathon Millar, Chad, and Ian Millar all posted faultless performances, allowing Canada to complete round two on a perfect score of zero. However, Team USA finished with an identical score of five faults after two rounds to force a jump-off.

Team USA's Madden was the first to come back. Despite a speedy effort in a time of 33.40 seconds, Madden had a rail at the double combination for four faults. This left the door open for Ian Millar, who displayed his legendary ability to stay calm and cool under pressure, putting in a careful, clear performance in a time of 41.96 seconds to secure the win for Canada.

"I feel fantastic!" said Ian Millar after his winning performance. "This is a great team! Chris is a very exciting up and coming rider for us. And it's always been a pleasure to ride on a team with my son, Jonathon. Kara Chad is only 18 years old, and here she is jumping a double-clear round. How good is that?"

Although Chad has represented Canada on Young Rider Nations' Cup Teams at competitions in Belgium and Austria as well as in 2013 and 2014 in Wellington, Florida, she is new to the senior international level.

"It's super exciting," she said of her Canadian Team debut. "I honestly did not expect to jump double-clear. It was my dream, and I guess it came true. My horse is absolutely incredible, and I couldn't be happier.

"I feel like I have such experienced and welcoming teammates," she continued. "Being 18, it's a little bit intimidating coming on to a team like this with such amazing riders and amazing horses. But I've learned quite a bit on the trip so far. It takes a lot of dedication and team spirit. Thank you to all of my teammates for helping me go through this."

Terrance "Torchy" Millar reprised his role of chef d'equipe for the Mexican event, commenting, "I would like to thank, on behalf of the riders and everybody who has come to this show, Furusiyya for their sponsorship of this amazing series, and also the support that Longines has shown to Nations' Cup sport."

On Sunday, May 11, the four Canadian team members contested the \$150,000 Gran Premio Veracruz Grand Prix. Held in a unique format, the top 15 competitors advanced to a second round, carrying forward their first-round scores. Ian Millar moved forward and became the top-placed Canadian aboard Star Power after incurring four faults in the opening round and jumping clear in the second to finish sixth overall.

Not far behind were Sorensen and Bobby. Having accumulated eight faults in the first round, a clear and speedy performance in round two put the pair in eighth place overall. Riding Alberto II, Chad incurred a total of 12 faults over the two rounds to finish 12th overall.

"This is as good a facility as anywhere in the world for show jumping," said Terrance Millar. "I haven't seen better, so for us it was a treat to be here and we thank all those involved with putting on this event."

The Mexican show jumping tour was made possible through Sport Canada's 'Own the Podium' program, a national sport technical initiative designed to help Canada's summer and winter athletes achieve podium success at the Olympic and Paralympic Games. While in Mexico, Team Canada was supported by Team Manager, Karen Hendry-Ouellette, and Stable Manager, Darren Roberts.

The third and final qualifier for Canada will be held at Canada's own Spruce Meadows in Calgary, AB, during its CSIO5\* 'Continental' Tournament from June 12-15. Having one the first two qualifiers in Wellington and Mexico, Team Canada heads into the final qualifying event with a total of 200 points. Team USA follows with 180 points, while Mexico is in third position with 160 points.

The 2014 Furusiyya FEI Nations' Cup Final takes place from October 9-12 in Barcelona, ESP.

# Eric Lamaze Claims Grand Prix of La Baule, France

**Canadian Olympic Champion Eric Lamaze rode Artisan Farms LLC's Powerplay to victory in the €200,000 Grand Prix of La Baule on Sunday, May 18, in France.**

It was an extremely emotional win for Lamaze, who won the CSIO5\* La Baule event, the highest ranking on the international show jumping calendar, on one other occasion in his career, in 2011 with the magnificent Hickstead.

"This is the first five-star grand prix that I've won since Hickstead," said Lamaze, who was smiling from ear to ear as tears rolled down his cheeks during the awards ceremony. "It is super exciting to win this grand prix. It's a grand prix that I've won before; I know what it feels like to win in La Baule!"

Fifty of the best horses and riders in the world attempted the €200,000 Grand Prix of La Baule with nine jumping the first round clear to advance to the jump-off. Lamaze, who was eighth to return, set off at a full gallop, skillfully encouraging Powerplay across the ground and making tight

turns back to the obstacles. He raced through the timers in 35.83 seconds to easily eclipse the time of 37.53 set by Abdelkebir Ouaddar of Morocco riding Quickly de Kreisker. France's own Patrice Delaveau placed third with a time of 37.60 seconds with Carinjo HDC.

Powerplay stepped into big shoes by claiming the La Baule victory. Acquired by Artisan Farms LLC last spring from Switzerland's Pius Schwizer, Lamaze has been riding the 10-year-old Holsteiner gelding (Casall x Limbus) for almost one full year.

"I've never asked Powerplay to do something like this and to go so fast," explained Lamaze, who in a spur of the moment display of delight, leapt off the podium during the awards presentation to spray the supportive audience with celebratory champagne. "Last year was a learning year with the horse. I've really taken my time with him and been respectful of how careful he is. He's not a super-fast horse, but sometimes when you get to know a horse, you know when you can take risks.

"Today, it felt like it was time to be competitive. It felt like the time was right for me to ask him to do this."

Lamaze and Powerplay will return to Canada to compete throughout the Spruce Meadows Summer Series in Calgary, AB.

# Young Guns!

## Versatility is the Name of the Game for Brennan McCullagh and Gotham City

Brennan McCullagh, 15, of Stonewall, MB, is no 'one-trick pony'. The talented young rider has been making a name for himself not just in the jumper ring, but also in hunter, Pony Club, and even dressage circles.

Having grown up on his parents' Quarry Ridge Farm, McCullagh comes by his passion for riding honestly. His mother and coach, Catherine McCullagh, has been an active equestrian for most of her life, also showing in hunter and jumper disciplines as a junior rider, and even competing at Calgary's famed Spruce Meadows.

McCullagh began riding at the age of six, and has never looked back. He started showing just one year later, and also became active in the Quarry Ridge Pony Club, which operates out of his family's farm, with Catherine stepping up as the lead instructor.

"I started showing on a little Icelandic Pony in the cross-rail divisions at local shows," explained McCullagh. "After that, I got my first pony and started riding and showing her. I did a lot of Pony Club events, and we did pretty well at rallies at the D and C level."

In 2011, McCullagh made the move from a pony to a horse, after his family purchased Gotham City. 'Best' as she's known around the barn, is a thoroughbred/Dutch Warmblood-cross mare that was born and bred at Sidgin Stables of Stonewall, MB, and sired by Quo Vadis Stables' renowned stallion, Oxford.

McCullagh began competing with Gotham City in 2012, and was immediately successful. The pair finished the year as the Manitoba Hunter Jumper Association (MHJA) division champions in both the Child/Adult and Open Low Hunter divisions, as well as the 'B' Equitation division.

That same year, they tested their mettle in the dressage ring with equal success, resulting in McCullagh earning a berth to represent Manitoba in the Pre-Training level at the Canadian Pony Club Dressage Championships, hosted by Rocky Mountain Show Jumping in Calgary, AB.

After having just one day to become familiar with a pre-selected mount in Calgary, McCullagh competed with great success.

"I was paired with a lovely, experienced thoroughbred mare named Lancaster. I was surprised to find out that I scored a 70% in my first test and won the class," explained McCullagh, who was paired with a different mount for his second class, earning fifth place to finish fourth overall in the Pre-Training division.

Back at home in Manitoba, McCullagh and Gotham City proved their versatility by adding in jumper classes toward the end of the season. It soon became clear that the duo is equally talented when it comes to the speed and precision required of the jumper discipline.



Fast-forward to this year's Royal Manitoba Winter Fair, held March 30 to April 5 in Brandon, MB, and it's clear that McCullagh and Gotham City's winning ways aren't confined to any one discipline.

McCullagh's large collection of red ribbons from the Royal Manitoba Winter Fair spanned a variety of classes, from Child/Adult Hunter to 'B' Equitation to .90m Jumper. He picked up the reserve championship in both the Child/Adult Hunter and Junior Low Hunter divisions, plus achieved the top overall hunter score of the day after receiving an 85 to win the Children's Hunter Special.

As the cherry on top, McCullagh also topped the .90m Mini Prix, and took third place in the \$5,000 1.10m Team Cup.

“It was Gotham City’s first time in the bigger jump ring and it felt great,” said McCullagh of his jumper success. “I’d like to keep getting into the jumpers more this season and maybe into some higher heights.”

Rising heights are at the top of this 15-year-old’s list of long-term goals as well.

“I’d like to keep going higher in jumpers. And, I also want to keep progressing through the levels in Pony Club,” said McCullagh, adding that he would like to work toward achieving ‘A’ status, the highest level offered, in Pony Club.

Considering his achievements in the past few months alone, the Canadian Pony Club is extremely likely to be adding another ‘A’-level rider to their list in no time!

## World’s Most Extensive Equine Surfaces Study Published by the FEI

The world’s most extensive study into the effect of arena surfaces on the orthopedic health of sport horses in the seven FEI disciplines (and in racing) has been published by the FEI.

The Equine Surfaces White Paper is the result of a four-year collaboration among eight equine experts from six universities, three equine and racing-specific research and testing centres, and two horse charities in Sweden, the UK, and the United States.

The White Paper brings together the latest data and published scientific papers on arena and turf surfaces, and the effects these have on horses in training and in competition.

Key properties of footing, and the effects of footing on horses’ physiological and biomechanical responses, are described in the White Paper, as well as the optimal composition, construction, and maintenance of arenas for maximizing equine performance while minimizing injury risk.

“The Equine Surfaces White Paper is the biggest international collaboration of its kind, and is vital to understanding how surfaces work in order to reduce injury risks to horses,” said John McEwen, FEI 1st Vice President and Chair of the FEI Veterinary Committee. “Now, thanks to scientific research, and extensive support and partnership between welfare charities and horse sport, we can fully understand how the right surfaces (with the necessary preparation and ongoing maintenance) can extend the working lives of sport horses and produce the best performances.”

# 10 Questions With ... Billie Derouet

Despite being just 22 years of age, Billie Derouet of Bromont, QC, has already been riding for 15 years, and she's been competing for nearly as long. Her many highlights as a junior rider include winning the Quebec provincial title for the 1.30m jumper division in 2005 at just 13 years of age. That same year, she finished second in the CET Medal Final at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair. Derouet has the unique distinction of being the only person to be awarded the Gillian Wilson Trophy twice as the Equine Canada "Junior Equestrian of the Year", winning in both 2005 and 2007.

She has also represented Canada twice at the North American Junior and Young Riders' Championships (NAJYRC), bringing home a Team Silver Medal as part of the Quebec junior team in 2007 and placing fourth overall in the Eastern Division of the Jump Canada Talent Squad Series with Sweet Dreams.

In 2011, Derouet furthered her career by competing in France, Switzerland, Belgium, and The Netherlands. Most recently, she has been focusing on the development of her young horse, Bonaparte. The pair won the Quebec provincial Five-Year-Old Young Jumper Champion title in 2012, followed by the Six-Year-Old title in 2013. With Trapatoni, Derouet contested the Jump Canada National Talent Squad Final at the 2013 Royal Horse Show in Toronto.

**1 What was the name of your first pony?**

Inuk. He was 19 years old when my parents bought him for me, and I was seven years old at that time. He was such an amazing horse – the best schoolmaster I could ask for!

"Hold Strong" by Rob Bailey & The Hustle Standard. It's great motivation when I do my work-out!

Riding Sue and Aerial Grange's 11-year-old Belgian Warmblood gelding, Dixon, Millar bested a nine-horse jump-off over a track set by Germany's Werner Deeg.

# Caledon Pan Am Equestrian Park Re-Opens to Rave Reviews

The newly-renovated Caledon Pan Am Equestrian Park, site of equestrian events for the 2015 Pan American Games, opened its doors for the first show of the season during The Classic @ Palgrave Phase 1 held May 14 to 18 in Caledon, ON.

The competition marked the first of five weeks of International Equestrian Federation (FEI) sanctioned competition to be held at the Caledon Pan Am Equestrian Park in 2014. Produced by Equestrian Management Group (EMG), increased prize money and opportunities to earn valuable FEI World Ranking points have attracted show jumping athletes from around the globe to experience the Pan Am facility one year in advance.

Following an extensive rebuild and renovation in preparation for next year's Pan American Games, the Caledon Pan Am Equestrian Park received rave reviews all week long, including from 10-time Olympian Ian Millar, himself a three-time Pan Am gold medalist.

"It's fantastic!" raved Millar, who caused an internet sensation with his interview for the Town of Caledon, available here (<http://www.caledon.ca/en/panam/video.asp>). "This facility will assure us the best equestrian events of any Pan American Games and, just as importantly, it reminds me of "Field of Dreams" - build it, and they will come!"
